Throughout the week, campers played computer games from the SUPER WHY web site to reinforce the literacy skills being taught in camp. Each day, campers played a game with the character of the day!

### ALPHA PIG'S AMAZING ALPHABET MATCHUP GAME

In this memory-style game, the kids need to make matches with a letter card and a card that has a word that starts with the same letter. Kids have to remember where the cards are on the board in order to find an amazing alphabet match!

## WONDER RED RHYME TIME BINGO

Preschooler get to play the classic Bingo game while reinforcing their word family and rhyming skills! On each turn, they must choose a word that rhymes with the word Wonder Red says. When they rhyme all of the words on the board, a special picture will be revealed!

### PRINCESS PRESTO SPECTACULAR SOUNDS BINGO

Preschooler get to play the classic Bingo game while reinforcing their letter sound/encoding skills! When Princess Presto says a letter sound, your child picks the card with the letter that makes that sound! A special picture will be revealed when he or she has picked all of the correct pictures by sound!

# SUPER WHY RIGHT ON READER MATCHUP!

Preschoolers practice their vocabulary skills in this game of memory! Your child needs to look for two cards that have synonyms on them, two words that mean the same thing! Remember where each word is in order to find its match!

### SUPER WHY'S STORYBOOK CREATOR

Preschoolers can choose one of four classic fairytales (3 Little Pigs, Little Red Riding Hood, Princess & the Pea or Jack and the Beanstalk) and make it their own using the power to read! In this activity based game, each page contains a sentence from the classic story; but, with the power to read, your child can pick a new word to create his or her own tale. Once your child has completed the story, read the story online, print it or email the story to a friend or family member. Your child's name will also appear on the cover of the newly created storybook.
